Under 35 ???

Signalling Do you play USDC – **Upside Down Carding?** Contrary to standard signals, that means **Low Encourages** and **High Discourages**. Count signals are also upside down. A low card = even number while a high card = odd number. If you play these methods then you must extend the agreements a bit further – a smile discourages, while a frown encourages!!

Regional Finals of the NSW Country Teams will be played at Ballina on Sunday 13th September. There will no regular session of bridge on that day.

Grand National Pairs The first round of the Grand National Pairs Championship of Australia (GNP) will played at the Ballina Bridge Club on September 9th, 16th and 23rd. The GNP will be played as match pointed pairs and only players with less than 300 Masterpoints will be eligible to participate. The format will be modeled on that of the GNOT, and the tournament will have three stages. Ballina participants will be asked to pay \$20 on the first day which will cover entry fees for the three sessions. Successful pairs from the Ballina Club selection stage will proceed to compete in a Regional Final at Club Banora on Sunday 25th October. The winners of the Regional Finals will then be eligible to play in the National Finals in Canberra. Gold Masterpoints will be awarded at every stage, and there will travel subsidies

from the ABF.

This is a wonderful opportunity for



♥ Ballina players to compete in an event of national
♥ importance. Special Gold Masterpoint scales will apply
♥ and awards will be made to 90% of the field. Let us
♥ hope that some players from Ballina are able to fly the
♥ flag for the Northern Rivers in Canberra in January,
♥ 2010, as Winston Guymer and Paul Cruickshank did in
♥ 2009.

Eric's Bidding Tip

With four clubs and four spades, a hand strong enough to open 1NT, but no stopper in EITHER red suit, open 1♣.

♦ AKJ4 ♥ 87 ♦ 654 **♣** AKJ4

Open 1♣

Do not open 1NT with this hand.

RHO opens 1♣ and you hold

♦AT76 **V**KJ109 **♦**AJ7 **♣**K3 **Double**

Rather than overcall 1NT to show 16-18, it is better to double in case partner has a 4 card major. He may not be able to bid it, if you overcall 1NT.

Do not overcall 1NT with this hand.

Eric's Playing Tip

Always assume that your opponent will never lead away from an Ace against a suit contract.

When you are declarer in a suit contract, and you RHO leads a low card, or an honour, always assume he does not have the Ace ("Never lead away from an Ace")

Who has the Ace? East ofcourse, So do not play the King. East may hold

a singleton Ace or Ax and then your King

will live to fight another day.

Play low. You know East has Ace. Let the lead run to your Jack.

Eric's Defensive Tip

(A) ??



When discarding, keep parity with dummy's or Declarer's suit. If dummy's side suit is AK73 and you hold 8642, do not discard any card from this suit – the 8 will beat the 7 on the 4th round.

If declarer has bid a side 4 card suit – try to keep

parity with this suit. Declarer plays in a Heart contract, having opened 1♥, and rebid 2♦. If you hold four

Diamonds, do not discard any – you do not want to allow

Declarer's 4th Diamond to become a winner.

<u>Do not discard down to a void in any suit</u>. When declarer runs this suit and you show out, a finesse is automatically marked against partner.

When partner leads a small card against a NT contract, make sure you keep a card in that suit to return to him.
