Restricted Players ie with < 100 masterpoints please note a 'Change of Plan':

As announced last month the Harvey Norman Restricted Pairs has been re-scheduled to – Thursdays November 10 & 17. Please try and pair up with other players who have < 100 masterpoints for this 2-week special event.

And Round 2 on Thursday 17 will also be our Club Qualifying event for the NSW Under 100 Championships (UHMP). When this session is scored for masterpoints pairs will only compete against other pairs in the same masterpoint 'bracket' so: 0-10, 10-25, 25-50 or 50-100. So a great chance to 'bag' some state red masterpoints.

Then there's more! On Thursday 24th November we plan to hold

a Local Final for the NSW UHMP Championships. This event is only for players with < 100masterpoints as at 1 September 2022. All Local Finals, across the state, will play the same boards and the results will be matchpointed across the state, and handicapped. The Handicap System



Ballina Bridge Club gives out a voucher for a free game to each player in a pair that has the top percentage, after handicapping, in a section of 10 or more tables. This applies to any pairs session that has been scored using the normal Matchpoint Scoring. Our software, Compscore 3, has a system that calculates a handicap result for each pair based on the percentage they achieved in a session and previous performance data for the players in that pair.

An example from a recent session (names redacted) shows Pair 4 to be the handicap winners. Their session percentage of 57.41 was handicapped down to a result of 55.75. You can see that the inexperienced third place pair for EW had their session score of 44.15 boosted to 53.96.


Understanding these top level calculations is easy enough. Next to each player's name is a percentage figure that could be positive or negative. This is Compscore's handicap for the player. A positive figure is for a player whose average of recent result is under 50%. So a negative figure denotes a player who has been doing well lately. For any pair, it is the average of these two figures that is added to the session percentage to determine the handicap result. The calculation for Pair 4 is 57.41 + (2.40 + -5.72)/2= 55.75

The Compscore handicap figures are regularly changing to take into account newer results and to eventually ignore older results. The system allows for players having different partners on different days and for the sessions to have different standards by having a player handicap per day. It is assumed that both players in a pair have contributed equally to any particular session result.

So for every member and any day of the week, Compscore will look at the last 8 pairs results which Mark Miller

include that player on that day. If there are 8 results then the highest and lowest results are ignored and the remaining 6 are averaged to determine Player Performance Data for that player on that day of the week. If there are less than 8 results than all available results for that day are averaged.

The lower level calculations are a bit harder but an example from the West player of Pair 4 should help. This is from a Monday session and the player had a handicap of -5.72 so must have some good recent results. Compscore can be used to look at this recent Monday history.



The data on the right has the most recent results sorted numerically and the highest and lowest results denoted with an asterisk. The average of the middle 6 results is 54.76 and this shows against Monday on the left.

I supplement what Compscore is doing here in a few ways. If a player does not have at least 4 results in the last two years for a given day then I assign a figure of 90%. Players must have some recent performance data to be eligible for a handicap voucher. The artificial value of 90% pushes that player down in the list of handicap results. If a player does not have 4 recent results for a particular day but does have recent results for another day then I assign a value. For example a Saturday figure is 95% of the Monday figure for a player without recent Saturday data but with recent Monday data. This is aimed at allowing a player to start playing on a different day and be fairly eligible for a handicap voucher.

The final step in the handicap process is to calculate those figures you see against the player names on the handicap printout. The system assumes that 50% is a standard result and for each player determines how much their recent Player Performance Data is above or below 50%. This difference is scaled by a factor of 1.2. Continuing with the example above we can see that the West player of Pair 4 has a Monday average of 54.76 this determines a handicap of -5.72 using the calculation (50-54.76) * 1.2 (sometimes there is some roundoff error).

Having the Multiplier set to 1.2 rather than 1.0 slightly favours players with a positive handicap and correspondingly disadvantages the players who have been doing well recently. The intention here is to encourage the less experienced players with an occasional award when they have done well.

Compscore does not have a process to handicap a Teams Event but I have created one that uses Compscore's Player Performance Data as a starting point.

Where were you born?

I was born at the Ayrshire Hospital at Moss Vale on 28th May, 1935.



What lesson have you carried throughout your life from your early days?

As my father was a dairy farmer, but somewhat of a dictator, which caused an eventual break-up of our family, I was determined to be less that way inclined.

What was your first job? What did that involve?

My first job, after leaving school, was in the laboratory at the Berrima Cement Works where my job was to collect samples of cement powder & other items used in producing the cement. I then formed small cement blocks which were tested at various intervals, for their strength. I was anticipating a study at university

being offered a Teachers' College scholarship, was encouraged to change my aims so took up the scholarship at Armidale Teachers' College in Agricultural Science. I started my teaching career at Woodenbong Central School & later moving to Kikoira, Lorne, Eltham, Southern Cross & Manifold schools. I have lots of pleasant memories of my years of teaching & keep in touch with a great number of former pupils & their parents. What family do you have and what do they do?

While teaching at Woodenbong in the 1950s, I met & married a

wonderful girl called Joan & we were married in 1957. We had two children before leaving that district (Kerry, born in 1958 & Peter born in 1959). On moving out west, our son Scott came along in 1962 & nine years later, while living at Eltham our fourth child, Fiona was born. Kerry became a primary school teacher after attending Lismore College & later completing a B.A. via Southern Cross Uni. She became a Deputy Head at Lennox Head & later took up positions at JIS (Jakarta International School & at West Papua). Peter, on the other hand wanted to be a manual arts teacher, but after two years training was told that there wouldn't be any vacancies in that area for some time, so changed his course (at Armidale Uni) to Agricultural Economics which he passed

honours). with Unfortunately, he developed diabetes & was advised to do more physical type of work, so took a job managing a macadamia farm in the Lismore District before purchasing his own farm where he has become one of the top macadamia producers in the district. Now Scott left school in Year 11 to take a building apprenticeship but ended up becoming a diesel mechanic, and later got involved in the building area. Fiona, who was very fond of art, attended Griffith Uni in Brisbane for her B.A. & Hobart Uni for her M.A. & has been involved in Art Galleries & Schools ever since. She is at present a curator at Lismore Art Gallery.

What other interests do you have outside Bridge?

Beside Bridge, I have, over the years, been involved in rugby league (before I was married), tennis for over 70 years, golf for 40 years, Masonic Lodge for 60 years, Family History since 1979, a JP for 50 odd years, travel both in Australia & overseas, snooker, reading, singing, exercising, arranging BBQs & Bus Trips etc at Crowley Village, farming, family & puzzles.

What led you to take up Bridge and when?

I have always been a card player from when I lived at home as a small boy. We were taught to play most card games back in the 1940s while listening to the old radio serials such as Mrs Obbs, Burtons of Banner Street etc. On retirement in 1991, I was running

a small macadamia farm at Clunes & living at Lennox Head where I played tennis at the Ballina Club & golf at Byron Bay Club. However I developed a very painful right shoulder which I was unable to correct which stopped me playing sport. In August 1991, while doing the local census, I happened to meet up with that wonderful expert bridge teacher, Janet Brown, & after some discussion was invited to attend a class of 16 learners at her house in Sandstone Crescent, commencing on the 10th August. From then on, for the last 32 years I have enjoyed playing bridge.

What advice do you have for newer players?

Bridge is probably the world's number one card game & has many advantages to offer players. It has a great number of benefits for new players, especially in a club such as Ballina Bridge Club. Mentally it requires concentration, which is good for the mind, particularly for older folk, helping prevent dementia. In a friendly club, such as ours, it enables members to make many contacts with a great deal of social benefits both within & without the club. Often when our sporting days are over & we need something to occupy our time, so bridge is the ideal substitute. We provide tuition, which is undertaken by a number of very friendly teachers who introduce the game at your own rate with competition at a gradual pace. Some players, who take up the game, become very skilful while most of us just enjoy

playing & have a pleasant social time.

You have made a significant contribution to the club over many years. What do you consider to be the most rewarding?

Back in the mid 1990s Ballina Contract Bridge Club had some problems, which led to the Club splitting in two, with the formation of a separate club called the Ballina Seniors. At that time both the Seniors & the Ballina Bridge Club had only 43 players each. At that time, I was able to arrange for us to move back to the Masonic Hall after some discussion with my Masonic friends & at a reasonable charge. As we had always aimed at having our own premises we commenced searching for such possible places. This took a few years, during which our numbers grew considerably, thanks to a number of teachers, & at last we were offered the lease of some council land along North Creek Road. John Maxwell (a solicitor friend of mine) explained that funds could be raised by selling debentures to members, which we did & raised additional funds to enable us to build our present building. Since then, the club has gone ahead in leaps & bounds, mainly due to hard work by many of our members, particularly our teachers, till now we own both the building & our three blocks of land (with many indoor assets & \$132,000 in the bank). We purchased three blocks of land by selling debentures to our members again. Barbara Meaney was president from 1998 to 2001

when I was her vice president & I followed her as president at which time we paid off our first loans. I became a director in 1998 & head director in 2011 for 4 years. In the early years there were very few sub-committees, so it was the job of committee members to carry out most of the duties.

What do you consider to be the greatest strength of the Club?

The greatest strength of Ballina Bridge Club is to provide a society & club house where members can enjoy the playing of Bridge in an atmosphere of friendship & consideration & at the same time assist members to improve their play to their ability. We are very fortunate in having so many hard-working members who do so much to keep the club functioning

Story of a System Card

Arthur Renshaw and Geoff Brooks decided that it might be a good idea to sit down together and review/make a System Card. They diligently went through all the items.

The next time they played they had a clear idea of what they were saying to each other with their bidding and hey presto! A result of 71.49% scored on Thursday September 8th.

Blackwood Extra

Blackwood is a commonly used tool to check that the key cards are available for making a slam. The general rule of thumb is that there are six cards which are key to a successful suit slam. The four Aces, the King of trumps (the controls) and the Queen of trumps. Having five of these six key cards is required to bid a small slam.

Don't forget that you need enough overall strength to take 12 tricks! 33 points is the generally accepted number for making a small slam.

Most players these days use some form of 'Roman Key Card Blackwood' and are adept at discovering how many of the 'big five' controls the partnership holds. Asking if partner has the Queen of trumps is not done as often and the method may not be obvious.

If partner shows two controls the response normally indicates if the Queen is also held - two **without** the Queen or two **with** the Queen. But what if partner shows zero Controls or one Control? A separate bid is used to find out if the Queen is held.



Suppose the auction starts like this

Suppose you now want to know if partner holds the \checkmark Q? Bid 5 \blacklozenge , the next available bid. This asks partner to sign off in 5 \checkmark if they do not hold the Queen and bid anything else if they do.

So, without the Queen the slam is avoided. If partner does hold the Queen the normal action is to show the cheapest King that is held.

In the example above bidding 6 would give a lot of information. It shows that the $\lor Q$ is held (because you didn't sign off). It shows that the $\bigstar K$ is not held (because you went past 5). It shows that the $\clubsuit K$ is held.

In summary, if partner asks for Key Cards and your response does not give information about the Queen of trumps then the next suit up asks if the Queen is held. If you do not hold the Queen then signoff at the five level. If you do hold the Queen then treat partner's question as a 'King Ask' and respond as you normally
