+ National/State Events where Ballina BC are competing


1. ABF Interclub Knockout Teams:

As reported in our June and July newsletters we entered 3 Teams in this national event held online on RealBridge; in Division 1: Open, Division 2: <750 masterpoints, and Division 4: < 50 masterpoints. The format is 3 rounds of qualifying then the Top 8 Teams in each division proceed to 'Finals'; the finals also taking 3 rounds (quarters, semis and then a final). Rounds were scheduled once a month so the event is now approaching the semi finals stage.

In Division 1: Our Open Team (Marjorie Askew, Bill Powell, Gary Lynn, Clive Klugman) finished 9th in qualifying so just missed out on progressing to the finals.

In Division 2: Our Team (Carol Hocking, Jean Lowe, Phil Hocking, Cathy Hocking) finished 7th in qualifying and so progressed. In the quarter finals they were defeated by Newcastle.

Do no harm

As a defender, it is not always about beating the contract. Sometimes your goal is to not grant the contract to declarer on a silver platter. A, so called, passive defence is needed.

A passive defence begins with a passive opening lead. What are some auctions or contracts which indicate the need for a passive lead?

A Grand Slam — a trump lead from two or more small cards is a good passive choice. Generally, the declaring side has good trumps so leading a trump is unlikely to give a 'free finesse'. Don't lead a singleton trump as your singleton is a hint to you that trumps are breaking badly and you don't want to give that information away.

Against 7NT, don't underlead an honour. You may just be giving declarer the 13th trick without them having to guess which finesse to take.

6NT — Choose a suit with no honour cards. Your aim against 6NT is not the same as against 3NT. You are not trying to find a way to generate five tricks. Making an aggressive lead against 3NT that gives away a trick but possibly generates more tricks later could be the right move. Against 6NT, the trick you give away might be the 12th. Do no harm.

Where the strength is on your right — Auctions like these

• 1NT passed out

- 2NT passed out
- 1NT : 2NT inviting, passed out
- 2♣ (strong): 2♦ ; 2NT, passed out

In all these cases the hand on your right has shown strength and the hand on your left is much weaker. Do *not* underlead an honour. If declarer is going to take a finesse then it will come to you. If your lead exposes an honour in partner's hand then it was probably available to be finessed by declarer anyway, nothing is lost.

Against a trump contract with no long suit in dummy — Simple auctions like $1 \Leftrightarrow : 2 \diamondsuit; 4 \spadesuit$ or $1 \checkmark$ $: 4 \checkmark$ tend to mean that neither dummy nor declarer will have a long side suit to provide a source of tricks. Again, you should aim to give nothing for free to the strong hand on your right. A trump lead from two or three small ones is your best bet. On these sorts of auctions, declarer's problems will be with the side suits so don't give them any help.

The Prince of Leads

None of the above applies if you hold the **Prince of Leads** - a sequence of honours. If you hold a three card sequence of honours (AKQ or KQJ, for example) then lead your top card. These leads have the benefits of very rarely giving anything away, taking tricks and setting up future tricks.

I noticed a recent lead of "fourth best" from \blacklozenge KQJ64 — I had to get



my handkerchief out to wipe away my tears as my partner made two



tricks with < A103, very sad.

Consider board 11 from the GNOT qualifying -



West has bid strongly during the auction and finished as declarer in 6NT. As North, you are on lead.

If you were leading against 3NT then a Heart would attractive in the hope of setting up some juicy length tricks should partner get the lead later. But against 6NT you should be looking to make a passive lead around to the strong hand on your left. Avoiding suits with honours (Hearts and Diamonds) you should choose the $\clubsuit9$. A Spade would work just as well. On this particular layout there is no cost when you lead a Diamond *but* any card from the Heart suit gives declarer their ambitious 6NT contract.

Reverses or "Breaking the Barrier"

1. Introduction

A lot of people tell me "I don't play reverses". This is understandable from a simple perspective as you are just describing your hand shape to your partner. The problem is that you are not describing your point count accurately.

What is partner to understand from your bid? Do you have 12 points or 17 points? This can make the difference between a part score and game or game and slam.

It is important for you to recognise and understand the implications of a reverse and how it can help you and hinder you. Yes it can make life a little more complex.

2. What is a reverse?

Often called "breaking the barrier" for good reason. After opening and partner responding, there are a number of bids you can make to further describe your hand. Your "barrier" is 2 of your opening suit. For example, if you open 1D, your barrier is 2D. Similarly, if you open 1H your barrier is 2H.

If your bid exceeds your barrier you are telling your partner that you have a GOOD 16 or 17+ hand.

This is forcing for at least one round. This is why opener needs 17+ points for this bid. Their 17 and your 6+ will hopefully allow you to make a contract at the 3 level.

Responder can also reverse. The same rules apply for responder except they need less points because opener has shown an opening hand, all responder needs is a game force hand (12+ points) to reverse, Responder reverse is game forcing.

3. Another way of looking at it

A reverse was once described to me as a bid that forces partner to support my first suit at the 3 level. For example, 1C - 1S - 2H - Responder has to bid 3C to support openers first suit.

To support openers first suit:-

- 1C 1H 2D responder must bid 3C
- 1H 1S 3C responder must bid 3H
- 1D 1NT 2H responder must bid 3D

4. Yet another description

Another description is that BOTH the level and the suit need to be higher than the first bid. The examples above corroborate this description.

5. Examples of Openers Reverse

Here are some examples of partner reversing



Reverses or "Breaking the Barrier"

2D	


The barrier was 2C after opening 1C. Bidding 2D shows 17+ points.



You – 17 points	Partner
1D	1S
2H	

The barrier was 2D after opening 1D. Bidding 2H shows 17+ points.

6. Examples of Responders Reverse



Your Partner Opens	You – 14 points
1D	1S
2D	3H

Responders barrier was 2S, by breaking the barrier responder is showing game values. Opener may also have 4H but is not be able to bid them because it would be a reverse.



Your Partner Opens	You – 14 points
1D	1H
2D	3C

Responders barrier was 2H, by breaking the barrier responder is showing game values.

NOTE – Opener must rebid their suit for responder to reverse. If opener bid a different suit, responders reverse would be the 4th suit. Fourth suit forcing is a different concept to a reverse.

Reverses or "Breaking the Barrier"

7. What do I bid if I cannot Reverse?

With this hand opener plans to reverse to show 17 points and 5D and 4H.

But what if you have this hand



You open 1D and partner bids 1S. You cannot bid 2H as this is a reverse and shows 17+ points. 1NT does not look like a good idea with a singleton, so you settle for 2D. If partner is strong enough, they will make a forcing bid to uncover your 4 hearts.

Responder knows that you have 12-14 points because you did not reverse.


You cannot bid the 2 hands in the same manner. One hand shows 17 points and one 12-14. This is VERY important if you are ever going to find the correct game or slam.


8. Quiz

9. Conclusion

Playing "reverses" permit a partnership to describe their point count more accurately than if not playing reverses. If responder has an opening hand they will ensure that they now make a forcing bid to uncover a hidden 4 card major. If responder is weak, then playing at a lower level might be the correct bid.
