Farewell for Maureen Baker




Maureen joined the club in 1998 and has been a regular attender since then. She has served on both the Play and Management Committees and was a Director for a

Charity Day 2023

This year the recipient of our annual fundraiser will be a charity and disease that you have likely never heard of.

There is a brain cancer that kills over two thousand Australians every year without regard to age or sex .It has no known cause, no known cure and sadly has a 100% fatality rate with an average life span after diagnosis of only 14 months.

It is called glioblastoma.

Glioblastoma Australia (GBM) is a Registered Charity set up to find ways to assist diagnosed patients in coping with the inevitable radiation and chemotherapy that is the standard treatment designed to give the patient as much time as possible. Research is being carried out in the US, India, Germany, the UK and here in Australia but there is nothing yet that has been a breakthrough.

Glioblastoma Australia can help patients cope mentally and physically with the consequences of diagnosis and treatment by funding cancer nurses in hospitals to give specific care to these people.

Similar to the care given by the McGrath Foundation breast care nurses, patients with glioblastoma need support with overcoming the fear, coping with the debilitating treatments, managing the drugs and hospital visits, affording the dental care required, even to buying a wig to look "normal".

Famous people such as John McCain (US Senator) and Beau Biden (President Biden's son) have died from this disease.

It has touched our friends here too. Jenny Wardley's husband succumbed to glioblastoma and now Rebecca Rogers' daughter is fighting it.

Back to Basics

If your partnership is going to declare a particular board then there are two things you need to resolve

- 1. The strain
- 2. The level

Strain is just a shorthand way of saying No Trumps, Spades, Hearts, Diamonds or Clubs.

When I say level here I am just referring very broadly to part score, game or slam.

I will explore these basic concepts through the lens of partner opening 1NT.

The Strain

Typically, when choosing the strain we look for a Major first. If that does not seem to be possible then we consider playing in No Trumps and the last resort is a minor. Imagine partner opens 1NT (15-17 balanced), what are you thinking with regard to the strain with these hands?



If your first thought is "Looks like one of my typical hands" then you want to be sure to bid correctly. What strain do you think is best with this collection? With just a single high card point it is easy to just Pass out of fright. But the level is the second thing to consider, the strain is the first. If the strain is No Trumps then how many tricks will this hand take? Not many, possibly none. On the other hand, if the strain is Spades how many tricks will you take? Hard to say but definitely more than none, five trumps are going to provide a few tricks even if just by ruffing your short suits.

The strain you want to play in is Spades. Partner may only have two but your hand will make two or three tricks more in **Spades** than No Trumps.




Once again, what strain do you want to play in? Some people play that when they open 1NT it may not contain a five card Major. In that case, it is easy. There is no eight card Major fit and there is nothing to argue against playing in No Trumps.

But what if your 1NT opening may contain a five card Major? You may have a fancy gadget to find out (some variation on Stayman, perhaps). But using gadgets is not compulsory! Say, partner had five Spades in their 1NT opening, where do you want to play? You have no shortages, you

will not be ruffing anything with your hand (remember this is no advantage gained by ruffing in the long hand). There is no advantage to playing in a suit contract and making game in No Trumps only requires nine tricks, not ten. Your hand has the same strength in No Trumps as it does in Spades.

The strain you want to play in is **No Trumps**. Don't use your gadget. All you will do is give the opponents information about declarer's shape without getting any advantage for your side.

The Level

You have made your first assessment of what strain you want to play in. You also need to consider the level — part score, game, slam or not sure (yet).

Example 1 - Not very difficult, you want to play in part score. Playing transfers you would just bid 2♥ and when partner responds 2♠ you can Pass.

Example 2 - You have 11 High Card Points. Partner has promised from 15 up to 17. That gives the partnership at least 26 points, enough for game. But at most 28 points, not enough for slam. Respond 3NT, nothing else. Using Stayman would be wrong. Inviting with 2NT would be wrong.

Example 3 - Eight High Card Points but don't stop counting! Partner opened 1NT so they must have at least two Hearts. That means you have a guaranteed eight card fit. You must add your distribution points to properly evaluate the strength. You singleton Spade is worth three points because you have a fit. Your hand is worth 11 points. Add to partner's minimum of 15 and you should evaluate that the correct level is game. Playing simple transfers you would bid $2 \blacklozenge$, partner responds $2 \blacktriangledown$. You must rebid $4 \clubsuit$.



Very similar to example 3 but a little weaker. Now you have six High Card Points but you still have the three distribution points. The partnership total is now between 24 and 26. You do not know the correct level, maybe part score is correct and maybe game is correct. You have to ask partner.

Your rebid of 3♥ says two things to partner



1. Hearts are trumps, no argument

2. Are you top of your range?

The 1NT opener can now re-evaluate their strength in the light of what you have told them. For example, if North has a doubleton Club then they could add one point as there is a Major suit fit (because you told them).



Q1) What strain should the contract be in. Don't know — Spades if partner has three or more, No Trump otherwise

Q2) What level should the contract be. Don't know — Game if partner is maximum, part score otherwise. Any which way you look at this hand you should see nine points. Eight Hard Card Points plus either one length point in Spades if the

final contract is No Trump or one distribution point in Clubs if the final contract is Spades.

Yikes! This looks like a problem hand, we know neither strain nor level. Start by using the transfer bid of 2♥. Partner will rebid 2♠. Looking back



at example 4 you should realise that bidding 3 A would be wrong because that tells you partner that you have six Spades which is not true. In this case you should rebid 2NT.

Back to Basics

I have exactly 5 Spades and need help to make game.

That bid tells your partner that you have exactly five Spades (with only four you would not transfer, with six or more you would rebid your suit).

By not bidding game you are *inviting*, asking partner to make a judgement call based on the information you have given them.

Partner's opening might be

♠Q107 ♥Q86 ♦AK95 ♣A53 — A minimum opening but a fit with your Spade suit - 3 ♠

♦Q7 ♥Q86 ♦AKQ5 ♣KJ103 — A maximum but no Spade fit - 3NT.

♠Q1096 ♥AQ87 ♦87 ♣AK98 — Only 15 High Card Points but add a distribution point for the Diamond suit because you have a known nine card Spade fit — 4 ♠

Final Thoughts

The main advantage of transfer bids is not that the strong hand gets to be declarer. That is nice but the more important thing is that responder, who has the most to show, get two bites at the cherry. The first bid (the transfer) gives some information but partner must respond and then responder can give even more information.

Opener bids 1C and responder bids 1H, followed by 1NT, bypassing the 4 spades.



Using simple traditional methods, responder with this hand can bid 2S. Opener knows responder is strong and either has 4-4 in the majors or 5-4 in the majors or better. We have not lost out fit.

There is however a better solution to this problem of missing our 5-3 or 4-4 fit and that is using one of these conventions

- Checkback
- two way check back
- new minor forcing

Each has its pros and cons. I think two way checkback is the most flexible and thus will present it below.

3. Two way checkback

After Stayman, transfers, and Blackwood, I would recomend that the next convention you learn is two way checkback. It comes up often, if not every session.

How does it work?

The auction goes 1C-1H-1NT - After opener has rebid 1NT, they may have 3 hearts and 4 spades in their hand. Therefore responder with 10+ points can use two way checkback to uncover these holdings.

3.1. How does it work?

After opener has rebid 1NT, responder can use these conventional bids

- 2C transfer to 2D, 10/11 invitational
- 2D game forcing

Or

- 2 repeat major to play
- 2 other major if hearts, no game interest, if spades 4-4 invitational 10/11
- 2NT 10/11 balanced

3.2. 2C by responder

2C by responder asks opener to bid 2D. It shows 10/11 points, invitational. After 2D, responder further describes their hand. For example rebids a 5 card major.

3.3. 2D by responder – GAME FORCE

2D by responder shows a game force hand. Opener now shows

- 4 of the other major first
- Without 4 of the other major, 3 of responders major
- If none of the above, 2NT

Responder can now place the contract.




